ARTS 1301 Art Appreciation, 3 credit hour Internet format lecture class

Catalog Description (3 credits): A general introduction to the visual arts designed to create an appreciation of the vocabulary, media, techniques, and purposes of the creative process. Students will critically interpret and evaluate works of art within formal, cultural, and historical contexts.

REQUIRED TEXT: *Introduction to ART: Design, Context, and Meaning* by Editor-in-Chief Pamela J. Sachant, PhD and also Peggy Blood, PhD, Jerrery LeMieux, MFA, and Rita Tekippe, PhD. This book is required reading and is provided via three read only pdfs on our class site in Blackboard Learn Ultra.

Student Learning Outcomes:

1. Apply art terminology as it specifically relates to works of art.
2. Demonstrate knowledge of art elements and principles of design.
3. Differentiate between the processes and materials used in the production of various works of art.
4. Critically interpret and evaluate works of art.
5. Demonstrate an understanding of the impact of arts on culture.

This course is designed to satisfy three hours of Creative Arts credit in the Foundation Component Area:

1. Courses in this category focus on the appreciation and analysis of creative artifacts and works of the human imagination.
2. Courses involve the synthesis and interpretation of artistic expression and enable critical, creative, and innovative communication about works of art.

- 1. Communications Skills:** “to include effective development, interpretation and expression of ideas through written, oral and visual communication.”
- 2. Critical Courses in the Creative Arts will satisfy the THECB Core Objectives of: Thinking Skills:** “to include creative thinking, innovation, inquiry, and analysis, evaluation and synthesis of information.”
- 3. Teamwork:** “to include the ability to consider different points of view and to work effectively with others to support a shared purpose or goal.”
- 4. Social Responsibility:** “to include intercultural competence, knowledge of civic responsibility, and the ability to engage effectively in regional, national, and global communities.”

This course will emphasize:

Critical thinking skills: creative thinking, innovation, inquiry, and analysis, evaluation and synthesis of information; communication skills: display effective development, interpretation and expression of ideas through written communication; social responsibility: emphasis an intercultural competence, knowledge of civic responsibility and the ability to engage effectively in regional, national and global communities; and work well with others and develop the ability consider different points of view.

GENERAL MODULE ACTIVITIES:

1. Required readings from text, content modules and internet websites
2. Assignments to be completed and submitted, also topics on the discussion board
3. End of unit tests which will be time limited, see calendar
4. Chapter questions (11) will close with the content unit close dates, see calendar- Some chapter questions will be completed in teamwork style and submitted as a group.

ARTS 1301; COURSE REQUIREMENTS:

1. Student must access the course on a regular basis
2. Student must login online at least 2 times per week
3. Student must complete all required assignments on time, please refer to the course calendar for the deadlines.

ABOUT THIS ONLINE COURSE:

This course is laid out in **4 Units**; each unit contains information related to chapters from the text, a chapter essay question and a test. Access to the content units is time sensitive.

Chapter Questions:

The **chapter question assignments** are located within the unit content; response to these questions is time sensitive and all 11 are required over the course of the semester. Access to these assignments is timed and close the same day that unit is closed. **Students are required to answer all of the 11 chapter essay question assignments!** Write up your essay in a .doc file and copy/paste it into the submission block. This way you will always have a copy of it and you won't experience the submission block timing out on you and losing your work.

IMPORTANT! How to answer the Chapter essay questions:

Follow the instructions in the Chapter Essay Question and answer the question, stay on topic! You will be graded on the content of your postings; this will be reflected in your final grade, as these questions comprise 40% of your final grade. The answers are in the textbook reading.

But remember:

First- keep to the topic.

Second- avoid subjective judgments.

Third- your answers must be thoughtful responses, reflections on the content of the text.

The questions will be graded after the unit has closed and grades for questions will be available in the **mygrades** section.

Remember -READ

One should not arrive at the end of the semester still holding the same level of knowledge you had when the semester began. An online class is different from a face-to-face learning experience- but all the reading is still your responsibility. I will be able to tell by your answers if you have read and integrated the material or not.

NETIQUETTE

From time to time I will open a discussion board with questions for you to post responses—please remember to use Netiquette when composing your postings!

I am looking for thoughtful, appropriate responses and anything other than that will be graded down. As with my face-to-face classes, **offensive responses, rudeness, and disrespect will not be tolerated.** Chapter and discussion question offenders will be first warned then dropped from the class upon the next offense, so watch your email etiquette. A good rule of thumb would be -if you wouldn't say it to someone's face-- as in a face-to-face class, you should not say it. Reconsider your message, reword it, refine it or forget it - keep it to yourself-- especially if what you are saying could be easily misinterpreted or interpreted as disrespectful. If you have any questions or comments about this, you should send me a private email within Blackboard. If you feel classmate is being disrespectful on the discussion board, you may email me through Blackboard private email for me to investigate; your name and concerns will remain private. If you are rude or disrespectful to me through email I will drop you from class, I will not tolerate that at all!

Check your Art-itude when composing your responses for the essay and discussion questions.

Every art movement, artwork and artist covered in this class, in the text and in the questions are valid and important additions to the historical dialogue in the field of visual fine arts.

Do not, DO NOT tell me that *you do not like* ____, or *you do not understand* ____ or display blatant disregard for any artist, movement or artwork being discussed. This type of response tells me several things about you:

FIRST, perhaps you have not done your reading.

SECOND, you are not trying to understand.

THIRD, you are avoiding answering the question.

FOURTH, you are allowing snap judgments or old viewpoints to get in the way.

Just remember, if I ask you about, ie: DADA or Fauves—tell me about the movement, not your opinion of them—base your answers in historical fact rather than telling me you *think they went over the top*. Art is a reflection of the time, culture, and society from which it was made, thus, to really understand some of the more complex movements, knowledge of world history is very helpful. The text has a great deal of information, is very easy to understand and quite inclusive. The content module information will help you understand the material better. You should have a curious, and open mind when you take a college course this one is no different.

More hints

The unit and chapter notes list the reading assignments in the beginning of each unit or chapter file. Do ALL the reading, including any hyperlinks for more valuable information. THEN formulate your answers for the chapter essay questions.

Unit Tests

At the end of each unit the student is to complete the **Unit test**.

- These 11 tests each consist of 20-25 questions of multiple choice or true/false type.
- The test questions are randomly selected from my database of chapter questions.
- You may take each test TWO times, and the higher grade will count.
- You have **45 minutes to complete each test**- you may use your text and notes as reference during tests if you wish, but be mindful of your time, if you have not read the material you will go over the time limit. The tests will shut down and automatically submit when time has expired.
- The tests are available on a time sensitive basis. I will not reopen any test for any reason, as each test is open for at least 7 days. If there is a malfunction of your Internet or if you want to retake it for a higher grade that second opportunity is there for you to use.
- Always check your calendar, note the chapter essay question, and test link availability dates to be sure you don't miss a deadline.
- There will be a short comprehensive Final Exam. It will be available the last few days of the semester. and should be taken after you have completed the Unit 4 test. The final exam also may be taken twice, and you will have 30 minutes to complete each attempt.

REMEMBER:

The **Blackboard** software used to manage this course tracks student logins, tracking when and where the student has been in the course. Accessing this course on a regular basis is extremely important in order to meet the requirements of this course.

HOW THIS COURSE IS CONDUCTED:

This is an online course, which means that you will access course information and respond to me and /or other students through the use of the Internet. I use Blackboard to deliver and manage this course. It is a software package that was written to help manage online courses. There is help available for students at the SPC Online Web site. AI Statement

- Purpose of Artificial Intelligence (AI) Applications:

AI applications such as ChatGPT, OpenAI, Bard, Grammarly, WordTune and others are advanced language models designed to aid and engage in meaningful conversations, as well as, generate and revise content. AI is intended to supplement learning, stimulate critical thinking, and enhance academic discourse. However, its use comes with certain responsibilities.

- Academic Integrity:

Using AI to generate academic work, including essays, reports, or assignments, without proper attribution is a violation of SPC academic integrity policies. Plagiarism undermines the learning process and is strictly prohibited. Students must ensure that their work reflects their own ideas, research, synthesis, and analysis and appropriately cites all sources, including AI.

- Collaboration and Consultation:

While AI can be a valuable resource, it is essential to strike a balance between seeking assistance and maintaining personal responsibility. Collaboration with peers, consulting instructors, and utilizing other approved learning resources should be prioritized. Overreliance on AI for solutions without actively engaging in the learning process is discouraged and can be grounds for academic integrity violations. Utilizing AI as a tool for brainstorming or research is allowed but the writing should be the student's own work and thoughts.

- Critical Thinking and Originality:

AI usage can provide suggestions and information, but it is essential to critically evaluate the responses and exercise independent thought. Relying solely on AI for answers deprives students of the opportunity to develop their analytical and problem-solving skills. In assignments where originality, creativity, and independent thinking are valued, AI would be detrimental to the student learning process. Critical thinking and originality emphasize the importance of independent thinking in all academic endeavors as part of

the student's learning experience apart from outside influence and offers the student the opportunity to refine their unique, individual voice through academic discourse with other students and faculty.

- **Ethical Use and Bias Awareness:**

AI is trained on large amounts of data from the internet, which may include biased or inaccurate information. Be mindful of the potential for bias and critically evaluate the responses provided by AI. Therefore, when using AI, just like with using any other database, students must verify that the information is from reliable sources, question any potential biases, and ensure that the information and sources used in the paper are neutral, peer-reviewed sources.

- **Responsible Engagement:**

Students should engage with AI in a respectful and responsible manner and avoid using offensive language, discriminatory remarks, or engaging in any form of harassment or inappropriate behavior. Students should also uphold the standards of respectful communication in addressing both AI and fellow classmates.

- **Compliance with South Plains College Policies:**

Policies regarding the appropriate use of AI in South Plains College courses are set by instructional departments and individual instructors. Appropriate use of AI may range from strict prohibition to assignments they may require the use of AI.
